Course Description

The concept of evolution is viewed as the central theme unifying all of biology. In this course evolutionary processes will be discussed in their genetic, historical, religious, and ecological contexts. Topics covered include the agents of evolution, speciation, macroevolutionary trends in evolution, human evolution, and the relationship between scientific understandings of evolution and Christian concepts of creation. These topics will be addressed from the perspective of teaching for conceptual understanding. The class includes a combination of lecture, discussion, lab, data analysis, and online simulations.

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. You will be able to explain the central concepts relating to the mechanisms of biological evolution and current understanding of the key events in the evolutionary origin of our own species.
- 2. You will demonstrate an understanding of typical experimental methods and data analysis used in the study of biological evolution.

- 3. You will analyze and present representative research papers in evolution.
- 4. You will access and use data and journals used in evolutionary biology.
- 5. You will examine the science and faith relationship in the context of evolutionary biology.

Required Texts and Recommended Study Resources

NOTE: Students are responsible to have the required course textbooks prior to the first day of class. Students are also encouraged to begin reading the books in preparation for the class as soon as possible.

All readings will be posted in Modules and will be accessible online. There are no texts to purchase for this course. The primary online textbook is <u>The Princeton Guide to Evolution</u> which you can access through the PLNU library. You will need your login and password every time you open it.

Course Credit Hour Information

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 3 unit class delivered over 16 weeks. Specific details about how the class meets the credit hour requirement can be provided upon request.

Assessment and Grading

Journal Analysis and Final Project: Three times throughout the course, you will be assigned an article to analyze. You will be asked to identify the main concepts and qualitatively assess the claims and evidence in the article. The analysis instructions and rubric remain the same each week. Additionally, in Weeks 13, 15, and 16, you will complete a culminating article analysis where you will select 3-4 articles of your choice, related to evolution, then analyze and present two of those articles to the class. This culminating article analysis is your final project for this course.

Discussions, Interactive Lessons, and Assignments: There will be approximately 7 hours of work assigned each week. Each week's assignments will open on Monday at 12:00 am. Individual assignments are due the following Sunday by 11:59 pm, but please do not wait until the weekend to complete your work. Assignments that require peer collaboration (including discussion boards) must be completed by Thursday of that week, to allow for peer comment or peer-to-peer meetings Thursday-Saturday, before final submissions on Sunday at 11:59 pm.

Exams/Quizzes: There will be three review quizzes; spread throughout the semester. There is no final exam.

Student grades will be posted in the Canvas grade book. Grades for Week 1 will be posted to Canvas no later than Thursday of Week 2. It is important to read the comments posted in the grade book as these comments are intended to help students improve their work. Final grades will be posted within one week of the end of the class. PLNU Course Modality Definitions

- 1. Online Courses: These are courses with class meetings where all instruction and interaction is fully online.
 - a. Synchronous Courses: At least one class meeting takes place at a designated time.
 - b. Asynchronous Courses: All class meetings are asynchronous.

- Hybrid Courses: These are courses with class meetings that take place both in the classroom and online synchronously and/or asynchronously.
- 3. In-Person Courses: These are courses that meet in person with the instructor and students in a physical classroom setting. With approval by the area dean, this may include up to 25% of qualified class interactions through a Learning Management System (such as Canvas).

PLNU Attendance and Participation Policy
