## **Course Description**

- 2. Recognize the responsibility we have to use our communication skills to engage and transform human culture.
- 3. Distinguish the scope of one's Christian perspective as it relates to human communication.
- 4. Appraise values and theory related to communication in a Christian context.

#### **Assessment and Grading**

Below you will find the assignments for the semester. Assignments and speeches will have grading rubrics that you are welcome to view at any time. Your final grade will be calculated by dividing the number of points you earn by the total number of points at the end of the semester. Here are the categories of assessment:

# I. Timeline and Intro Speech (55 points)

**II. Reflections on** *The Call***:** Students will complete a five-part reflection on material from the book. Each part will be listed in Canvas with due dates. (15 points each)

### III. Speeches (100 points each)

Students will prepare and deliver one speech in each module.

# IV. Speech Outlines (15 points each)

Students will submit a hard copy of their speech outline before presenting.

### V. Written Assignments (Points vary)

Students will submit a variety of writing assignments in each module.

# V. Participation (Points vary)

Students will submit research assignments, presentations, article reviews, collaborative work and personal reflection journals.

#### **Method of Instruction**

The course is taught through lecture, discussion, and class activities all designed to help you develop critical thinking abilities as you prepare for life after Loma. Lectures will often introduce material beyond that which is covered in readings and will assume information supplied in the course readings. It is your responsibility to come to class ready to think, challenge, analyze, and apply the material covered. Additional norms include:

- 1. Students are expected to attend class and be on time.
- 2. In the event of absence students seek missed information/notes from classmates and/or Canvas.
- 3. PLNU allows up to 25% of course work to be completed in Canvas and this section may use Canvas for much of the course work required. It has your assignments listed with due dates set and all the materials needed for the course beyond the textbook so be sure to set your Canvas user preference to get daily reminders for assignments due.
- 4. All written work must be typed, and attention should be paid to form (including grammar, punctuation, spelling, APA formatting and general appearance) as well as content. Late work will receive an automatic point deduction.
- 5. Integrity is of great importance. Plagiarism of any sort will not be tolerated and will result in a grade of "F" for the project and possibly the course. See university notifications below for specifics.
