Hands-on production of an online, student-run media outlet providing both a training ground for students interested in gaining experience in various aspects of digital media as well as high quality news

source for PLNU. Open to all students. JRN 2015, WRI 2016, JRN 2017, JRN2018 and COM 2075 may be repeated up to a combined total of eight units.

This course is conducted as a workshop to develop stories and media for lomabeat.com. Expectations of a workshop course include bringing ideas and media to share, giving and receiving feedback, and publishing publicly with your name attached. The instructor will help guide you while you work on projects and offer accompanying training and advice as needed to complete your work.

ASSESSMENTS AND GRADING
