This course is an introduction to the principles and practices of the theatre arts and an exploration of how the theatre has powerfully impacted human societies from the beginning of recorded history. We will employ lectures, applied reading, discussion, and participatory activities including group projects, and requires the attendance of local theatrical performances to this end.
