Course Description:

A survey of the human communication process. Emphasis is placed on intrapersonal, interpersonal, and public communication. Particular attention is paid to the preparation and presentation of speeches.

- 5. Develop the theoretical, practical, and spiritual foundations for effective communication.

To earn full points for class participation you should come to class prepared (reading assignment complete) and you should participate in class discussions and learning activities.

Reading Policy:

You are expected to read the designated chapters in the text **before** coming to class on the day the readings are due. Coming to class is **not** a substitute for reading the text, nor is reading the text a substitute for attending class. Class time will be used to build on your reading, not to review it as not all of the material from the book will be covered in class. Come to each class prepared to ask questions you have about the reading, to explore confusing aspects of the material, and to provide examples and illustrations of the theories and concepts covered in the text.

Professionalism:

Please be respectful of your peers and instructor at all times and recognize that both rhetorical and relational sensitivity are important in a course environment (as well as at work).

Final Examination Policy:

Successful completion of this class requires taking the final examination on its scheduled day. PLNU Academic Accommodations Policy:
