COURSE DESCRIPTION

A general view of the various definitions and forms of psychopathology is presented in a historical, sociopolitical, and cross-cultural perspective. The purpose and history of various diagnostic systems will be discussed. Using the DSM-5 as the main paradigm, some of the most prevalent psychopathologies of our culture will be explored. The purpose and usage of DSM-5 will be studied. The focus will be on building a cognitive diagnostic competence of, as well as an effective understanding and comfort with, the various mental health disorders. Attention will also be given to etiology, epidemiology, and treatment.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. The student will demonstrate an understanding of clinical diagnosis from the DSM-5, through the application of completing a clinical history, mental status exam, and intake evaluation. 2. The student will demonstrate competency in describing in detail the diagnostic criteria, onset, course of illness, as well as treatment interventions for a chosen psychopathology diagnosis. 3. The student will demonstrate competency in case presentation of the diagnostic criteria, onset, and course of illness for a category of DSM-5 disorders through class presentation.
- 4. Students will demonstrate the capacity to work collaboratively with peers.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

You will have at least one assignment per week that goes along with the topic of the lecture and chapter that week. These assignments will require you to read the textbook.

Exams (100 points each): There are Four (4) exams and it will be open the final week of the module. You will have 80 minutes to complete the exams and can start at any time of the day. Once you begin the exam, you must finish it in one sitting.

Case Study Paper (15 points each): For this project, you are required to write a case analysis of a famous individual who struggled (or struggle) with a psychological disorder. You will explore his or her life on several levels, psychologically, socially, culturally, historically, and spiritually. You will describe his or her diagnosis (or historically agreed upon diagnosis), and the progression of the psychological disorder in the person's life. You will attempt to chart this progression through the lens of his or her life, making a case for whether the individual's psychological struggles are reflected in his or her work and life. You will also discuss the etiology of the disorder. Finally, you will reflect on the relationship between mental illness and its ability to affect activities of daily living as well as how the individual's spiritual and religious life, if applicable, affected the illness (or vice versa). In writing this assignment, you will draw on course readings, lectures, and discussions. Of particular relevance will be those pertaining to the diagnosis and assessment of disorders as well as the chapter(s) related to the disorder of the individual (however, any and all of the course materials are relevant!). Your paper must be 10-12 pages, APA formatted, typed, double-spaced, 12-pt font. Note: Your title page, abstract, and reference page(s) do not count as part of your page count. There is more information on the case study handout, including ideas for individuals who suffer from mental illness. **Group Activities:** You will form a group and work with this group throughout the semester. Individual Assignment: For the individual assignments, you are welcome to work in a group to sort through the questions and use it as study time, but you must submit the individual assignments as individuals and accept your grade as your own.

Unit Exams: Finally, the unit exams are meant to wrap up the unit you are learning about. It is suggested you use your groups as study groups.

TRIGGER WARNING

I acknowledge that each of you comes to PLNU with your own unique life experiences. This contributes to the way you perceive several types of information. In Abnormal Psychology, we will cover a variety of topics, some of which you may find triggering. These topics include depression, suicide, eating disorders, and trauma. Each time this topic appears in a reading or unit, it is marked on the syllabus. The experience of being triggered versus intellectually challenged are different. The main difference is that an individual must have experienced trauma to experience being triggered, whereas an intellectual challenge has nothing to do with trauma. If you are a trauma survivor and encounter a topic in this class that is triggering for you, you may feel overwhelmed or panicked and find it difficult to concentrate. In response, I encourage you to take the necessary steps for your emotional safety. This may include leaving class while the topic is discussed or talking to a therapist at the Counseling Center. Should you choose to sit out on a discussion of a certain topic, know that you are still responsible for the material, but we can discuss if there are other methods for accessing that material and assessing your learning on that material. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of abnormal psychology, and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.

All assignments are to be submitted/turned in by the beginning of the class session when they are due—including assignments posted in Canvas. Incompletes will only be assigned in extremely unusual circumstances.
