COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OUTCOMES

Experience in reading, writing, and critical thinking centered on essay and research writing for Child Development. Students will design a research project that identifies a problem or dilemma within the child development field and provides research based outcomes or solutions to the problem. Library research and writing the source-based essay are major components of the course. This course needs to be passed with a C or better before proceeding with any other course in the program.

PROGRAM GOAL

The Bachelor of Arts degree program in Child and Adolescent Development (BA-CDV) is to provide working adult students the opportunity to complete a quality college degree via a schedule and format specially designed to meet their unique needs. This curriculum will help support student development toward a personal commitment to improving 1) the lives of individuals and families in their professional endeavors, 2) the lives of community members, and 3) their personal family life.

5. Synthesize information from a variety of sources to articulate and support a claim (PLO-3, PLO-4).

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

It is important to read the comments posted in the Grades area as these comments are intended to help the student improve their work. Grades will be based on the following guidelines:

Graded Course Components

Assignments: Assignments are created in the course and are used to measure understanding and to provide students with the opportunity to apply writing skills and resources aligned to the final research project and improving their writing skills. They include reflections, essay, rough drafts and parts of the final paper.

Research Articles: Throughout the course, students will be gathering scholarly, peer-reviewed articles to help them craft their Final Research Paper.

Problem and Solution Essay: The final project for this course is a research paper encapsulating the student's work throughout the course. It combines the research articles into a cohesive essay that illuminates a need in the field. Prior to the final draft of this research paper, students will complete a literature review and rough draft to ensure all of the components of a quality research paper are present.

Course Surveys: Students will provide feedback on the course through the mid-course and end-of-course surveys. These surveys are voluntary but are crucial to our continual improvement processes at PLNU. **The Course Surveys represent 0% of the overall course grade.**

All assignments are to be submitted by the due dates. There will be a 10% reduction of possible points for **each day** an assignment is late and assignments will **not be** accepted for credit four days after the due date. If missing assignments result in the failure to meet learning outcomes, students may receive a letter grade reduction on the final grade in addition to the loss of points for missing work. Assignments will be considered late if posted after the due date and time using Pacific Standard Time. No assignments will be accepted after midnight on Sunday night, the last day of class.

Students who anticipate being absent for an entire week of a course should contact the instructor in advance for approval and make arrangements to complete the required coursework and/or alternative assignments assigned at the discretion of the instructor.
