COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides fundamental principles governing the production, distribution, and exchange of wealth with an emphasis on current economic problems for business majors. Topics include consumer choice theory, decision-making of firms based on costs and revenues, income determination and distribution, market structures, market failures, the economic role of government, and globalization.

COURSE ORGANIZATION & LEARNING STRATEGIES

This course provides a comprehensive overview of the history of the occupational therapy profession, the nature of occupation as a core concept in occupational therapy practice, exploration of lived experiences of occupational therapists in various clinical settings, acquisition of knowledge about the frames of reference and models of practice used to shape clinical practice, discussion of OT process, and an introduction to the OT practice framework. Learning strategies include independent reading, small group discussions, and the use of audio-visual materials.

- Exam I and Exam II: Midterm (Exams I and II) questions may include multiple-choice, or problems based on text material, quizzes, assignments, and lecture videos. There will be an opportunity to complete revisions on the midterm exams to prepare you for the final exam. Each midterm exam is worth 15% of your grade.
- Final Exam: The final exam is comprehensive and worth 20% of your grade.
- Survey Question: During Week 1, survey questions will be available for students to answer to better
 understand their interests and their purpose of learning Microeconomics. Also, after the first midterm
 exam, mid-course survey questions will be available for students to answer to better understand their
