Some students may be required to take this course for one (1) unit; all other students may choose between zero (0) or one (1) unit. May be repeated up to a total of three (3) units."

ENG 1000L Writing Lab is a self-paced Writing Center tutorial for students seeking additional writing support. The course is designed to help you grow as a writer and find success with the writing you have been assigned across all of your courses in a given term.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of ENG 1000L, you should be able to:

- 1. Apply the conventions of the English language and creative skills in various forms of academic writing genres.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the stages of the writing process in academic writing: planning, drafting, organizing, composing, revising, and editing.
- 3. Evaluate and examine your own writing process.

ENG 1000L Requirements and Assessment

ENG 1000L Writing Lab is a credit/no credit course, which means that there will be no letter grad assigned at the end of the term. By completing the requirements above, your transcript will reflect

you have received credit (or not) for the course.

To receive credit for the course, you must earn at least 20 total points.

Students who do not earn a minimum of 20 points or who do not complete a minimum of six (6) writing consultation sessions will not receive credit for ENG 1000L. If you have any questions about the credit/no credit system, please contact the instructor.

Attendance and Participation

While there are no course meetings for ENG 1000L, students must complete a minimum of six (6) sessions with a writing consultant in the Loma Writing Center. Students should schedule their sessions through the Loma Writing Center appointment calendar (https://plnu.mywconline.com/). (Note: You'll need to register for an account the first time you use the appointment calendar.) You're welcome and encouraged to book additional sessions with a writing consultant, but you must complete at least 6 sessions.

Students who do not complete six (6) sessions with a writing consultant will not receive credit for ENG 1000L.

Required Texts and Materials

- You'll need access to the Internet, a PLNU e-mail account, and Canvas.
- You'll be able to complete your writing consultation sessions in the Loma Writing Center, but if you'd
 prefer to conduct those sessions online then you'll also need a device with a webcam and
 microphone suitable for virtual conferencing.

Course Credit Hour Information

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 0- or 1-unit class delivered over 15 weeks. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours per credit hour on their coursework. For this course, students will spend up to an estimated 37.5 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes.

Final Examination Policy

Successful completion of this class requires taking the final examination on its scheduled day. The final examination schedule is posted on the <u>Class Schedules</u>
