COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of the principles and techniques of security and investment analysis. Topics include securities markets, risk and return, modern portfolio theory, investing in common stocks and fixed-income securities, portfolio management and derivative securities, including options and futures.

- 4. Collaborate in teams to analyze an investment topic (PLO 2, 5 & C1).

INCOMPLETES AND LATE ASSIGNMENTS

Assignments are to be submitted by the due date. As answers for homework are typically reviewed in class and answers are posted in Canvas, late homework cannot be accepted. Other late assignments may be accepted at professor's discretion with grade reduction of <u>at least</u> 20%.

Additional information regarding graded events:

- a. <u>*Participation*</u>: Participation grading will be based on your attendance <u>and</u> <u>participation</u> in class sessions or outside interactions, <u>with a premise that your</u> <u>participation grade will reflect your course grade</u>, except in cases of high levels of participation.
- b. **Quizzes**: There will be quizzes during the semester consisting of multiple choice and true/false questions. Such quizzes will be given at the beginning of the class period and students must be present in class to take the quiz. The lowest quiz score will be dropped.
- c. <u>Murphy Minute Discussions</u>: There will be a short video posted in Canvas some weeks in which I will discuss something related to investment topics or recent events in the market. You will be required to make comments reflecting your view or understanding of the topic. This may require knowledge sources outside the course material or involve your personal knowledge or experience about a topic.
- d. <u>Homework Assignments</u>: There will be eleven (11) Homework Assignments, and the assignments will consist of problems provided by the instructor. The lowest Homework score will be dropped. As noted above, late homework assignments will <u>not</u> be accepted as I may review all assignments in class immediately after each

assignment is due. Submit only your own original work for Homework Assignments. While working together on Homework Assignments is encouraged, <u>you cannot share</u> <u>Homework Assignment (Microsoft Excel) files</u>. Homework Assignments must be **prepared using Microsoft Excel (or in a few cases, Microsoft Word)** and submitted through Canvas. Check your file after uploading it. Homework Assignments must include all work and supporting calculations in Excel for credit.

- e. <u>Team Stock Video Presentation</u>: Students will create a presentation covering a stock. Each presentation will be created as a team of three students, by video. The team will select a stock and provide information regarding the pros and cons of such an investment, with one student supporting a positive outlook or the potential rewards and the other student supporting a negative outlook or the potential risks. Further details will be provided in class. The grading will be based on the presentation content, delivery, and interim deliverables prior to the presentation. While teamwork will very likely affect the grade, grading will be done individually based on quality of each student's work.
- f. *Exams:* There will be a mid-term exam and a final exam. The final exam will be cumulative but weighted toward material presented following the mid-term exam.
