GENERAL EDUCATION MISSION

PLNU provides a foundational course of study in the liberal arts informed by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In keeping with the Wesleyan tradition, the curriculum equips students with a broad range of knowledge and skills within and across disciplines to enrich major study, lifelong learning, and vocational service as Christ-like participants in the world's diverse societies and culture.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to basic skill techniques, rules, safety, and etiquette leading to a practical golf course experience. Special fee. Skills of putting, short and long irons, driver.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Each Student will demonstrate the skills of putting, chipping, short and long irons
2. Each student will learn the rules, scoring and etiquette of golf
3. Each student will play 5 rounds of 9 holes at a golf course
4. Each student will write a response to a video package

SKILLS

- Putts – each student will putt 6 holes from varying distances, utilizing best ball scoring on the first putt in a two putt per hole test. (1)
- Chips – each student will chip 2 holes within a six foot radius, hitting best of 10 strokes per hole. (1)
- Short irons – each student will hit off the mat to distances of 40, 60, 80, 100 yds. Hitting 10 balls per distance the best of 10 within 15 yd. radius. (1)
- Each student will state the rules, scoring and etiquette of golf on a written test. (2)
- Each student will play a minimum of 5 rounds of 9 holes at Sail Ho golf course and turn in the filled out scorecard. (3)
- Each student will watch a designated You Tube video package and write a two paragraph observation report and turn it in. (4)

GENERAL EDUCATION LEARNING OUTCOME

Students will develop an understanding of self that fosters personal well-being.

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 1 unit class delivered over 15 weeks. FINAL EXAMINATION POLICY

PLNU ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATIONS POLICY

Once a student's eligibility for an accommodation has been determined, the EAC will work with the student to create an Accommodation Plan (AP) that outlines allowed accommodations. The EAC makes accommodations available to professors at the student's request.

PLNU highly recommends that students speak with their professors during the first two weeks of each semester/term about the implementation of their AP in that particular course. Accommodations are not retroactive so clarifying with the professor at the outset is one of the best ways to promote positive academic outcomes.

Students who need accommodations for a disability should contact the EAC as early as possible (i.e., ideally before the beginning of the semester) to assure appropriate accommodations can be provided. It is the student's responsibility to make the first contact with the EAC. Students cannot assume that because they had accommodations in the past, their eligibility at PLNU is automatic. PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university withdrawal date or, after that date, receive an "F" grade.

Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition

A day of attendance in asynchronous content is determined as contributing a substantive

note, assignment, discussion, or submission by the posted due date. Failure to meet these standards will result in an absence for that day. Instructors will determine how many asynchronous attendance days are required each week.
