Syllabus for Juvenile Delinquency - Spring Semester 2025

Course Description: This course offers an in-depth examination of juvenile delinquency, emphasizing social, legal, and political factors that influence the juvenile justice system. Through critical analysis of seminal texts and current research, students will engage with theories of delinquency and explore reformative measures aimed at system improvement.

- 2. Burning Down the House: The End of Juvenile Prison by Nell Bernstein

Course Objectives:

- Analyze the causes and consequences of juvenile delinquency.
