Course Description

This course is designed to improve your skills as a musician and bassist. We will work on technical exercises, study theory, and learn repertoire.

Necessary Technical Competency Required for Students

Ability to use Canvas (content pages, quizzes, groups, and collaboration), ability to use Microsoft Office, Teams, and Zoom. Students must have adequate piano skills to learn their music.

Required Texts/Readings

Students will be required to purchase scores and sheet music for repertoire that is chosen collaboratively with the instructor.

Students must have original copies of their music for both singer and pianist. Anything that is public domain can be photocopied as much as you like. Please use the library and interlibrary loan as much as possible and only purchase the music you really want. If I own a copy of the score, I will be happy to let your pianist use it in lessons, but rarely feel comfortable letting scores leave my studio.

 \cdot Students must respond promptly to requests and assignments from the instructor.

 \cdot Lessons are not to be used to learn notes. If students do not learn their notes in their own practice, the instructor will ask the student who use the lesson time to practice and excuse the student.

• Students are expected to record lessons and review them. There will be three written selfassessments during the semester that will refer to your lesson recordings.

• Students are expected to research all repertoire and create a style sheet format that edifies their performance experience.

 \cdot More than anything, students must practice at least five days per week.

- \cdot Definition of all musical terms with the musical selection
- \cdot List of recordings listened to for each selection
- · Personal views and character analyses of each selection

- · Particular technical, musical, or dramatic challenges to overcome
- \cdot Document your research in a short bibliography for each selection.
- · Please use resources online and from the library!

Requirements for Attendance and Participation

This is an applied class where you will be learning and making music and attendance is paramount. If you need to reschedule your lesson due to illness and give me 24 hour notice, I will provide one make up lesson per semester. If I am ill or out of town for a performance or conference, I will always offer you a make-up lesson. Lessons do follow the same schedule as classes, if there are no classes that day, there are also no lessons. Make up lessons are not offered if classes do not meet that day. If make up lessons are offered (due to my absence) and you choose not to sign up for one, that lesson will not count against your final grade.

All students are given two free passes. After two unexcused absences, subsequent absences will affect your final grade.

Student Collaboration Policy

Collaboration will take place between student and pianist. Pianists must be treated with utmost respect and appreciation. Other possible collaborations include duets and small ensembles with other vocal students. When sending a PDF or printing a hard copy of music for a pianist please ensure that all of the notes are on the page (especially bass notes).

Policy on Missed Work

Faithfully attending lessons, practicing, and participating will ensure that you do not miss work. I expect students to submit work on time, but in the case of emergency please reach out so we can find a solution together. Submitting some work or late work is better than submitting no work.

Daily practice is paramount to build your technique. We are training muscles, hundreds of muscles, many that we cannot see or feel. Set aside time daily to practice so that you can build on your daily progress. Even if your voice is tired, you can study your scores, play through new repertoire at the piano, translate foreign language texts, read plot synopses of the opera or musical, etc etc. If you aren't practicing, another singer is and they will get the gig!

Credit Hours Policy
